About eight days after Jesus said this, he took Peter, John and James with him and went up onto a mountain to pray. As he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning. Two men, Moses and Elijah, appeared in glorious splendor, talking with Jesus. They spoke about his departure, which he was about to bring to fulfillment at Jerusalem. Peter and his companions were very sleepy, but when they became fully awake, they saw his glory and the two men standing with him. As the men were leaving Jesus, Peter said to him, "Master, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters—one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah." (He did not know what he was saying.)

While he was speaking, a cloud appeared and covered them, and they were afraid as they entered the cloud. A voice came from the cloud, saying, "This is my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to him." When the voice had spoken, they found that Jesus was alone. The disciples kept this to themselves and did not tell anyone at that time what they had seen.

Jesus at the Movies

Montavilla UMC will host a screening of the film *Mr. and Mrs. Loving* on Wednesday, 2/17. This box office sleeper tells the story of Mildred and Richard Loving, an interracial couple, who married in 1958 and were then arrested for violating the State of Virginia's Racial Integrity Act of 1924, which prohibited whites and blacks from intermarrying. The couple were exiled from the state, but fought to return until the landmark decision of the U.S. Supreme Court in *Loving v. Virginia* (1967) unanimously declared all anti-miscegenation laws unconstitutional. The case provided legal precedent for legal advocates for same-sex marriage. Timothy Hutton and Lela Rochon star. The running time is 105 minutes.

Jesus at the Movies is an educational program of Montavilla UMC. This year's selections focus on ordinary people growing in faith, grace, and understanding as they engage with social, cultural, and justice issues. Film screenings are regularly held on the third Wednesday of the month at 6:00PM in the church library. Please feel free to bring a snack and to invite a friend. Discussion follows each screening.

Brown Bag Lunch to Feature Missionaries

Nan McCurdy and Miguel Mairena are missionaries with the General Board of Global Ministries serving as Mission Advocates in our denomination's Western Jurisdiction. They are itinerating through Portland in February and will speak at a UMW Brown Bag luncheon at Montavilla UMC on Wednesday, 2/17, at noon in Fellowship Hall.

This husband-wife mission team has worked for some 15 years with youth and women in San Francisco Libre, Nicaragua. During the war in Nicaragua in the 1980s, Nan and her late husband Phil worked in a pastoral ministry with people in the war zone, and after the war, she helped create the Foundation for Nicaraguan War Victims. She holds degrees in biology, ecology, and pharmacy.

Miguel grew up in an impoverished Nicaraguan farming family. He began first grade at age 20 and went on to graduate from law school in 2008 and complete a master's degree in criminal law three years later. In his native country, he provided legal counsel to women dealing with physical, psychological, and economic violence. He also counseled men about reproductive responsibilities and prevention of violence against women.

Miguel and Nan married in 1995. They work together as Mission Advocates to help annual conferences, districts, and local churches in the U.S. to understand

help annual conferences, districts, and local churches in the U.S. to understand and participate in global mission focusing on mission personnel and support of missionaries. They share a blended family that includes three daughters and three sons, currently living in four countries!

Nan says of her call to mission: "We are called to follow Christ's example: to accompany and promote the inclusion of the poor, the women, the outcasts, the old, the sick, the challenged, the children—all those not included fully in society." For Miguel, Jesus' words from Matthew 25:40 are a guide for mission: "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

All are welcome to attend this program and celebrate Nan and Miguel's visit with us.
