# Thoughts From Our Pastor

**F**riends,  
In graduate school, our professor for systems theory said that he “loved conflict.” I remember how shocking that sounded. Who loves conflict? I had never met anyone before who “loved conflict,” and I sat with the other students, slack-jawed and confused. My childhood was not without conflict, and I had spent much of my life up until graduate school avoiding conflict whenever and however I could. I knew enough about my classmates to know that I was not alone in this response.

However, the longer we listened to our professor, the more we came to understand not just the dangers of conflict, but also the quiet gifts it can offer. On the one hand, conflict can tear a system apart. It makes people angry, and words are often said that one wishes one could take back. Conflict drives us down into our limbic system — our emotional brain — which responds to stress through gut reaction rather than careful reflection. But conflict also clarifies two things.

First, conflict reasserts the truth. In every system, be it a family, an office, or a church, individuals hold different beliefs and



perspectives. In our attempts to get along, we shape what we say so that those differences appear less pronounced. We swallow what we really believe and go along with the crowd. Conflict enables people to speak the truth that they have been hiding or minimizing in order to keep the peace.

Second, and even more important, conflict tests the strength of our relationships. If the conflict is great and the relationship is weak, conflict results in rupture. But if the relationship is stronger than the conflict, the system can actually be strengthened. In healthy systems, conflict teaches people that they can share what they really believe without fearing that others will respond poorly. In healthy systems people work creatively to find appropriate compromises, and conflicts can confirm their dedication to the relationship regardless of the outcome of the conflict.

When I came to Montavilla, I was warned that your church had experienced some painful conflicts in the past. People had left over certain situations, pastors had lashed out at times, and the church had struggled in the wake of this. The system, I was told, “was weak and had been traumatized.” But you are no

longer the church you were. Although small, you are strong and the system we have built together is healthy.

In two previous churches I served, pews had been removed, and we evolved toward worship conducted in the round, using moveable chairs. In both those churches, the move was resisted at first but universally applauded later. I have a right to my memories of those previous churches and to my continuing belief that worship here would be greatly improved if we reconfigured the sanctuary. But you also have a right to your memories. You have a right to voice how important it is to sit where you have sat with loved ones who are no longer here. You have a right to remember how hard it was to get these pews, and how useful they are when special services, like funerals, occur.

At our August 27<sup>th</sup> Church Council meeting, I introduced a motion to remove the last few rows of pews in the sanctuary, and it was unanimously voted down. Because the system

is healthy, I was able to speak my truth and still celebrate the Council's decision.

As I shared with the Church Council, I want to instill in this congregation three things. First, I want everyone to have the courage to say what they really believe, trusting that others will love them and treat them respectfully, even if they disagree. Second, I want everyone to have the discipline to be voted down when they do make courageous motions, and to accept the will of the community over their personal perspectives and desires. Third, I want everyone to have the confidence to know that we are a healthy church, and thus can encourage people to speak the truth, even if that may lead to moments of conflict.

I love this church and give thanks to God for the wisdom and courage of our Church Council.
